  - a. List the things (good or bad) hindering you from faithfully following Christ.
- 3. Read Ezekiel 18:30–32 & 2 Peter 3:9. How does God's desire for people to repent challenge your current evangelism efforts? Why is withholding the Gospel from someone, no matter how sinful they are, wrong?
  - a. List out the names of 5 people that you need to evangelize to. Spend time praying this week for opportunities and strength to proclaim the saving Gospel to them.

- 4. Read Psalm 51 & Luke 18:9–14. How do these passages describe a contrite heart? What does it look like for someone with a contrite heart to participate in corporate worship?
  - a. How can you develop sincere worship with humility and contrition when you attend corporate worship times (e.g., Sunday Service, Men's & Women's Bible Study, LifeGroup, Prayer Nights)?
- 5. Read 1 Timothy 1:15–16 & 1 John 4:7–12. Why should we be concerned if we lack a desire to point someone to God's mercy? What practical ways can you remind people of God's mercy in your day-to-day conversation?
  - a. Read Galatians 5:16-25. To help you develop a deeper appreciation for God's love for you, list out different sins Jesus forgave you for and the new righteous fruit He has blessed you with since you have been saved.

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## **BIBLE STUDY QUESTION OF THE WEEK:**

Read Philippians 1:18b–26. What do the phrases "eager expectation," "hope," and "full courage" in verse 20 reveal about Paul's confidence in God despite his imprisonment? How does Paul's concern for Christ's honor help him face his imprisonment and suffering with joy? How does Paul's concern for Christ and his attitude while in prison change how you approach your troubles?
